- To narrow the attainment gap between disadvantaged and non-disadvantaged pupils.
- For all disadvantaged pupils in school to make or exceed nationally expected progress rates.
- To support our children's health and wellbeing to enable them to access learning at an appropriate level.

Some of the desired outcomes have only been partially met and will continue to be addressed in the academic year 2025/26 strategy.
