<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Took part in Deep Dive as part of the Ofsted inspection, where the school was graded, "Good". Feedback from the deep dive was positive and commented on the subject leader's confidence in leading their subject.</li> <li>• Curriculum offer has been re-developed to return to a pre-covid offer, taking into account missed learning.</li> <li>• Swimming offer has been adapted to allow for year groups that missed swimming due to covid, ensuring children are able to be safe and competent in the water.</li> <li>• Audit of playground equipment completed and new equipment purchased to ensure children have best possible experience.</li> <li>• Children have been offered opportunities to participate in a broad range of developmental and competitive sporting opportunities, which has had a positive impact.</li> <li>• Work-It-Weekly programme implemented as a targeted intervention for the underactive</li> <li>• Balance bike sessions taken by SEND unit children</li> <li>• EYFS staff completed balance bike training</li> <li>• Balance bike sessions given to EYFS children</li> <li>• An inclusive provision has been maintained, ensuring that SEND children are given opportunities to attend competitive and developmental sporting events, both in school and off site. For example, Seahorses children participate in sports day as part of their buddy classes.</li> <li>• A broad range of extra-curricular sporting activities have been offered, which focuses on Game Skills in KS1 and team sports in KS2, allowing KS1 children to experience a range of sports so that they can make informed choices about what they want to pursue in KS2</li> <li>• Sports Day planned to celebrate sport and offer all children an opportunity for competitive play</li> <li>• Staff attended various CPD sessions and fed learning back to adults in school</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Continue to develop extra-curricular offer to include a wider variety of team sports and other physical activities.</li> <li>• To continue to develop provision for 30 minutes of additional daily activity.</li> <li>• Continue to work towards gaining the School Games mark</li> <li>• Continue to take part in School Games events (in person)</li> <li>• Support staff with ongoing CPD</li> <li>• Research schemes of learning and evaluate whether the current scheme still best fits the needs of the school.
